GRADING POLICY: The following details the weight given to all coursework when determining your final grade average:

The most just and reasonable method of determining a student's grade consists of weighing <u>all</u> factors by the instructor. As your instructor, I will be using the following criteria as guidelines in the assigning of grades to you.

Grade of "A" - Excellent

- Consistently superior scores on examinations and other prescribed assessments.
- Assignments completed in prescribed form, on time, with evidence of careful research on subject matter and planned presentation.
- Consistently demonstrates critical thinking skills in terms of the subject matter of the course and assessments
- Knows how to apply subject matter in new situations
- Shows by behavior (written, verbal, social) that reasons for learning subject matter are understood and some application made.

Grade of "B" - Good

- Consistently above average scores on examinations.
- Assignments completed in prescribed form, on time, with evidence of some extra references and planned preparation.
- Presents independent ideas frequently on subject matter of the course and demonstrates above average critical thinking skills.
- Shows by behavior (written, verbal, social) that reasons for learning subject matter are understood and some application made.

Grade of "C" - Average

- Satisfactory scores on examinations.
- Most assignments completed in correct form and on time.
- Presents evidence of satisfactory grasp of assigned subject matter of the course and evidence of critical thinking skills in most assignments.
- Shows by behavior (written, verbal, social) that subject matter has some application to academic, social, or vocational goals.

Grade of "D" - Poor

- Below average examination scores but high enough to show attainment of at least the minimum course objectives.
- Majority of assignments completed, in imperfect form, and not always on time.
- Shows some grasp of individual units of subject matter, but little evidence of critical thinking skills.
- Shows some improvement in behavior (written, verbal, social) by direct application of some learned material, but with little insight.

Grade of "F" - Failure

Level of achievement does not measure up to competency required in the course.

THE FINAL GRADE WILL BE BASED ON:

• <u>Class participation, Homework (Written or Web-based), Case Studies, Group Activities, Discussion Boards, Pop Quizzes, etc. (200pts)</u>

Refer to the class attendance policy for class participation explanation. Students may be given homework assignments, online assignments (i.e. discussion boards), pop quizzes, group assignments and other assignments throughout the semester to aid in the understanding of material presented in the textbook and in the classroom.

- 1. Students are 'allowed' 3 absences. Each extra day absent for whatever reason results in a 20 point deduction from your 'participation' points. Example: 8 days absent = 5 additional absences X 20 pts = a deduction of 100 pts from participation pts. Save these days for when you are sick, etc. <u>Please</u> do not bring me excuses...this is why you get three days!
- 2. Homework is assigned for most class periods. I will inspect this homework only on certain days. Missing or unsatisfactory homework on the days I check it, will lose 20 points from your participation grade.
- 3. On any day an unannounced pop quiz may be given.
- 4. Students that are required to leave the classroom for disruptive behavior to include cell phones, PDA, MP3 players, laptops use will lose participation 20 points for that class period.

Self-Assessments (150pts)

Self assessments are used in the process of gathering information about yourself in order to make an informed career decision and being successful in college and beyond.

- ✓ Self Directed Search (SDS)- This assessment is based upon self reported interests and abilities derived from John Holland's six themes of areas of work.
- ✓ VARK Assessment- The assessment provides users with a profile of their learning preferences.
- ✓ The Golden Personality Type Profiler- This assessment helps students understand how they make decisions and relate to others. Students will develop a deeper understanding of their strengths and weaknesses.

<u>Cultural Experience Assignment (25pts)</u>

This assignment will give the student an opportunity to get involved in a campus activity or local event. Research has shown that students who are involved on their campus or in their community outside of the classroom are more successful students.

Goal Outline Assignment (25pts)

This assignment will give students the opportunity to develop and map out their Career, Academic, Personal and Social (CAPS) goals. The instructor will provide guidelines for successful completion of this assignment.

• Career Project (100pts)

Students will develop a career project. The objective of this project is to engage the student in the process of career development and looking at college majors. Student will also develop a resume with the project. The instructor will provide guidelines for successful completion of this assignment.

Tests (300pts)and Final Exam (200pts)

The format can include but will not be limited to, fill in the blank, matching, essay, multiple choice and short answer. The purposes of assessments are to assess your knowledge of what we have covered in class and in the assigned readings, your needs (i.e. I may need to repeat some content that a majority of students did not understand) and to encourage students to keep up with material covered in class.

MORE ON GRADING POLICIES

- All assignments must be typed and submitted on or before the due date. NO LATE work will be accepted.
- All typed assignments must have a title page and be secured by a staple. If there is no staple points will be taken off the assignment. The title page must have the following information on the page: Your name, the class name and section, the title of the assignment, as well as the due date to be eligible for the full credit for each assignment.
- TEST POLICY- If you miss a Test, it will be recorded as a zero, however if you miss an test you will have an opportunity to complete a comprehensive essay Make-up Test on Monday, November 21, 2011 during class time. This can be used to replace a zero earned by not taking one of the tests. You can only use this to replace one missed test. This policy is in fairness to your fellow classmates and to me. Thank you!!!
- No Make ups are given for POP QUIZZES.

- Proper spelling, punctuation, and sentence structure will be taken into consideration for the final grade on each assignment. In college and in your careers, you must possess excellent written and verbal communication skills.
- Please make attending class a priority for your success in this course.
- The final exam will be given on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>December 7</u>, <u>2011</u> which will be the last time we meet for class this semester.

WITHDRAWAL POLICY AND ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS: Regular attendance is crucial to your success in this course. Attendance will be taken.

<u>Tuesday, November 8, 2011</u> is the last day to withdraw from this course and receive a "W" on your transcript. <u>Your instructor will not "AW" you and the responsibility of withdrawing from class falls to the individual student.</u>

The course attendance policy is tied to the participation grade. Class begins promptly at 2:30pm. Please demonstrate professional behavior and be on time. Please note that (2) two lates equal (1) one absence. Class attendance is expected and required. Each student is allocated 3 absences throughout the semester. (Includes excused and unexcused). Any absences thereafter will affect your participation/ attendance grade.

Additionally, on days when group participation is required, an absence will automatically result in a reduction of the participation grade (others will have to take up the slack for the absence of a classmate). These participation days may be unannounced.

Remember, the syllabus pacing schedule is subject to change at my discretion, so you need to be in class to stay current. If you have excessive absences in this class, passing the course will be virtually impossible, but again, you will be expected to take the responsibility of withdrawing yourself from this course. I wish for you to succeed in this course, but please do not expect me to cover material with you on an individual basis when you choose to be absent from class. Unfortunately, my schedule does not offer me the time to do so, and frankly, I'm a big believer that students should attend class regularly.

TCC EMAIL/BLACKBOARD: Please check regularly your TCC e-mail account. Please communicate with me using your TCC e-mail through Passport/Blackboard. Your success at TCC will be promoted by regularly checking your TCC e-mail for important announcements. Most all offices on campus and instructors at this institution utilize TCC e-mail for their out-of-class correspondence with you.

This is a "WA" class -- web-assisted -- the class has a website using Blackboard. The site is used to post materials, assignments, and grades. You are expected to use the website as part of this

Not all class materials will be available in the electronic format. Do not count on simply accessing the class website to obtain all that was done during class.
